Each student also received a book, donated by The Civitan Club, of their own choosing and reading level upon completion of their project. It was a fun and creative way to promote art and reading together, just in time for March is Reading Month.



## Online Prompts Help Promote Inspiration, Motivation, & More Art

Last week, I completed my third year in a row of "February Flowers," an online daily art challenge. Again, it was hosted by artist, and Insider Studio founder, Amanda Evanston as a private Facebook group throughout the month of February. Similar to previous years, the entire month of prompts were provided upfront. The overall purpose of the challenge is to brighten up February, while creating new art each day, regardless if the prompts are stuck to or used as loose inspiration. Participants are encouraged to share with the group as well as across all social media platforms. All all mediums, sizes, techniques, and interpretations are welcome.



And you know what? It was amazing! The talent, the online community, the encouragement, the tips, the shared techniques, the artwork! Amazing!!! Some participants, spent days working on multiple prompts. While others, posted redos, or in-progress pieces. Others created daily doodles in date books and planners, while others collaborated with their kids to create fascinating and fun works of art!



Because, I create a majority of these in the evenings after work, I kept all of my pieces at 5in x 7in to keep them at a manageable, non-overwhelming size. I also tried to give myself a more firm time limit than I had in previous years, as a way just to let the art happen and reduce stress. While this may have made me choose something different on certain days to fit my self-imposed restraints, it felt good overall. And on days, I was unsatisfied or wished I would have painted or drawn something different I made a note to revisit that prompt on a day I felt stuck again. I did not redo during the month. I told myself whatever happens, happens. The challenge is about making something every day, not making something perfect. Believe me, this mantra helped. I also used this challenge to experiment, which as an artist I think it is hard to do most days as we all instantly want to pick up our favorite medium and stick with our personal style, but I felt like this challenge gave me permission to just go for it! Get out of the box! Try something new!



I successfully created several pieces that were in a much "looser" style than is my norm, which was surprisingly satisfying. I experimented by adding ink pen to my waterbrush pieces. And I also found googly-eyes in my "odds and end drawer" to add to a collage of mixed-media grapes.

Like in previous years, I referenced most of my own photos and experimented with mediums: acrylics, waterbrush, oil and chalk pastels, colored pencils, sharpie markers, cut paper, glitter, and foam core based on my decision for each day's prompt, which included (pictured right, top to bottom), "Geranium," "Fluffy," and "Roses." However, (pictured below, left to right) "Collage," "Texture," and "Hollyhocks" inspired the most creative moments of the past month, as these prompts pushed me out of my comfort zone to be spontaneous and abstract with out-of-the box techniques. Once done with Day 29, it was fun to compare this year's collection to the previous two. Other favorite prompts included, "Cheerful," "Scrumptious," Poetry" and "Starts with H." Maybe you can try one of these?

So, the next time you find yourself stuck in a rut or just want to try something new, but don't know

what to do, go online and do the first art prompt you find and have fun!


